Essay Structure (Part B)

Before planning your essay, it is very important to analyse your essay question and marking guide. (See <u>Instructional</u> <u>Words</u> and <u>How to Analyse Assignment Instructions</u> handouts).

An essay has three main parts:	1)	Introduction
	2)	Main body
	3)	Conclusion

To understand the purpose and nature of each section, let us look at the following sample essay question:

Discuss the common biological, psychosocial and behavioural changes experienced by the elderly. Relate the changes that occur with ageing to nursing practice.
