A Quick Guide to APA Referencing for Nursing: Reference Examples

When you quote, paraphrase or summarise other people's information, ideas or opinions, cite your sources in the text of your assignment. In addition, provide a reference list containing full information for each cited source.

Therefore, unlike most other references, you need to name the specific database in the reference entry. Use italics and capital letters (e.g., Name of Database). Also, include a retrieval date, as these databases change their content regularly, and do not archive previous versions of the articles. If the URL requires a login or is session specific, meaning readers cannot access the information you have used, provide the URL of the database or login page instead of the URL of the work (as in the Lippincott Advisor and Morey examples). Begin a reference with its title if there is no author.

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Personal communication (e.g., lecture, guest speaker, email, interview) Cite personal communication in your assignment text. Do <i>not</i> include personal communication in your reference list, as that information is not recoverable.	Registered Nurse B. Thompson (personal communication, May 11, 2021) reported that Or (Registered Nurse B. Thompson [personal communication], May 11, 2021).	Capitalise a job title only if it comes immediately before a name.
When citing personal reflections from your practice journal or work placement journal, refer to yourself as "the author" because most assignments and assessments are graded through anonymous marking (also known as blind marking). This means the marker is not supposed to know the name of the assessed student, which helps to ensure impartial marking. <u>Do <i>not</i></u> include your practice journal or work placement journal in your reference list, as that information is not recoverable.
